Attend events

Get involved in IE Week events! We are teaming up with various UCSB departments to host or promote an array of cultural and educational events throughout the week.



Share your spoken languages



If you are multilingual, indicate this in your email signature or on your departmental website's people directory. This lets others know you're able to communicate with them in a language that may feel comfortable, nostalgic, or useful (for practice) to them.

Share your name pronunciation

Names are often intrinsic to our identity, so it's important that we do our best to use the correct pronunciation. By using a "hear my name" tool, you can proactively share your name pronunciation anywhere your name appears (think email signature, social media, LinkedIn, etc.). You can create your personal name badge on Name Coach for free.

Show your support on Zoom

Show your IE Week support with the Zoom backgrounds we created. Download the backgrounds, then open a zoom meeting. Click on the carat next to "Start Video" at the bottom of the screen. Then select "Choose Virtual Background" and hit the "+" sign to upload an image. Select the IE Week background you just downloaded and voila!

Fostering Global Connections

UCSB is an institution that is proud of our international students and scholars, also known as Global Gauchos. Every part of the UCSB community is enriched by the perspectives and contributions of our Global Gauchos. Read on to see how you can advance meaningful global connections.

Being a Friend to a Global Gaucho

- Ask Global Gaucho what name they prefer to go by, and don't be hesitant to ask them how to pronounce it
- Ask them about their own culture
- Ask them how their experience in the U.S. has been so far
- Understand that they may be experiencing feelings of loneliness, culture shock and homesickness
- Explain jokes, idioms, and cultural references used in class that may only be understood by domestic students
- Understand that these students and scholars are attending a high-ranking research university with English as their second (or third or fourth!) language, while adjusting to a new education level, environment, country, etc. Try imagining if you were in their shoes
- Include them in and out of the classroom (i.e. socials, group projects, etc.)

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Making Friends as a Global Gaucho

- Take a moment to remember that UCSB is happy to have you.
- Introduce yourself to your fellow classmates and colleagues. This can be helpful for making friends
- Attend events on campus. There are tons of events offered at UCSB, where you can meet people with similar interests. Shoreline has an Events page
- Attend an OISS English Conversation Club meetings found in Shoreline
- Attend an OISS All Languages Language Exchange Event, also found in Shoreline
- Consider joining a Registered Campus Organization (RCO), also known as student organizations. These are groups created by students, which you can find on Shoreline
- Working on campus with your peers is another way you could meet friends
- Give yourself time and grace. Friendships don't always happen immediately, and it may take time to find community

NAFSA publishes <u>Congressional</u> <u>Recommendations</u> that address the legislative policy changes which would lead to a more globally engaged and welcoming United States.

Advocate
